"The generosity and dedication of this year's RYA Volunteer Award winners is simply astounding.


Each one of you listed in this booklet has been nominated by your fellow volunteers, club members and other members of the boating community in appreciation of a contribution which has exceeded all expectations.

#### Hazel Twiname



Hazel acted at the Chairman of the Eric Twiname Trust for many years and is now the Trust's patron. The Trust assists in the organisation and provision of facilities to enable and encourage

young people in full time education at schools or universities in the UK to sail or race. One of the Trust's criteria is that as many people as possible should benefit from a donation. The administration of the Twiname Trust is complex, requiring a delicate assessment of the many applications for grants in order to match them with the inevitable limited funds available and, in this respect Hazel's wise and compassionate opinion has been paramount.

During her time as Chairman, Hazel encouraged the trustees to develop the Trust into a more focused group that devotes more of its resources to 'grass roots' sailing and to assist youngsters on that all important first step on the sailing competition ladder. Under her leadership they have more than doubled the money spent on sailing since 1996.

# RYA Awards 2012

### David Vass



David has been a member of various RYA Scotland committees for over 15 years. During this time he has progressed from being a member of the Coastwatcher network, onto the Cruising

and General Purpose Committee; and has been Chairman of this committee since 2005.

David is dedicated and professional. He is level headed, consistent, and critically, able to differentiate between the role to be played by the RYA and that of other parties. This clarity of purpose and thinking, both as a member and as chairman, has fostered a committee renowned for high value, balanced and informed opinions. This reputation has subsequently seen RYA Scotland go from being consulted as part of some processes to being actively sought for advice prior to legislation or policy development and the inclusion of RYA Scotland within the Marine Licensing system.

His mentoring and advice have been of great value and insight to other committee members and he can be relied upon as a voice of reason and sound judgement.

# Michael Wigley



Michael was first elected to Council as a personal member representative in 1998. He was invited to join the Central Finance Committee in 1999 and has served continuously on Council and the

Finance Committee until 2011. In 2004 Michael was elected Honorary Treasurer by RYA members in 2004, a role he continued to serve until the post was abolished under the governance restructure that took effect at the AGM in 2011.

As one of the Officers of the RYA, Michael chaired two of the most important projects in the Association's recent history: the building of Portland House in 2009 and the Governance Review Working Party in 2011. Portland House is the single largest investment that the RYA has ever made and it was designed, built and delivered on time and to budget. It has been used to great effect by Team GBR as their training base for the Olympics and Paralympics, and the building stands as a splendid legacy for the Association from the 2012 Games. The governance review - which culminated in the adoption of completely revised company Articles at the AGM in 2011 - involved a fundamental re-think of how the Association should be governed and managed in the 21st century.

Michael has given his advice, his time and his personal commitment to the Association in an entirely unstinting way.



# The Francis Elkin Award

The Francis Elkin Award is given each year to an individual who has made a significant contribution in time, effort and personal endeavour in enabling people with disabilities to become involved in sailing.

Francis Elkin was a former Chair of RYA Council and a Trustee of Sailability from its inception in 1995 until he passed away in 2001. He worked tirelessly for Sailabilty and committed his time and energy to ensuring the charity was successful. The Francis Elkin Award was created in his memory.

# Martyn Collis

Martyn is passionate about improving the opportunities for people with special needs to take part in sport. Having worked in special education throughout his career, he brings a wealth of knowledge about what works and how to make it happen. This has been reflected in the impact he has had in Birmingham and the West Midlands.

Although Martyn is supported by Sailiability he has always given over and above his responsibilities to make a difference; volunteering large amounts of his weekends, evenings and holidays to accompany Sailability sailors on trips and to run events.

He established the Birmingham Special Sailing Association in 2004, raising thousands of pounds to buy Access dinghies and pontoons and to subsidise the cost of regular coaching sessions. He is also on the committee of the Enterprise Sailing Trust which ensures special schools are on their agenda. Martyn was also influential in establishing the only Royal Naval Combined Cadet Force section to be based at a special school.

His excellent ability to form relationships with partners has helped increase participation for people with disabilities. He spots opportunities and seizes them all. In a sport where the expense of specialist equipment can be a barrier to participation, Martyn works tirelessly to ensure this is never an issue by accessing grants and additional funding.

# Frank Avery

Seasalter Sailing Club



Frank joined Seasalter Sailing Club in 1958 and has been actively involved in the clubs committees almost since he started at the club.

Frank was a key person

leading the rebuilding of the clubhouse in 1979, and his efforts have ensured the club still exists today. Membership numbers almost doubled at that time and has continued to hold fast in more difficult times with a loyal membership. When a Development plan for the Club was called for in the late 1990's it was Frank who undertook the task to create and publish the first 5 year plan for the Seasalters SC. This plan continues to be a firm base on which the club continue to build on for the future.

Despite resigning from active service to the club, Frank remains the Club President and holds Honorary Life membership. He continues to offer his help and advice on any club matters which arise and his mantra of 'Sail safely and enjoy every moment' is one that everyone on the committee and at the club can get behind.
